City of N. Charleston's two O'Hear Avenue projects protected 10.5 acres of wetlands along Noisette Creek.





About the Urban Greenbelt Program

The Charleston County Comprehensive Greenbelt Plan established an Urban Grants Program to distribute the Greenbelt portion of the Transportation Sales Tax proceeds in the form of financial grants to urban areas of the County. The purpose of the grants is to distribute funding in an equitable manner for the conservation of greenspace.

Urban greenbelt lands contain the greatest population density and intensity of development, as well as the greatest concentration of jobs and economic activity. Conservation of greenspace for various uses is crucial in offsetting the negative impacts of increased density. Typical uses for urban greenbelt lands include urban parks, cultural/historic sites, reclaimed greenspace, greenway corridors and water access.
