For most of its history, agriculture virtually defined South Carolina, as its favorable climate led to a diverse crop concentration and robust agricultural economy. Today, as stated on the South Carolina Farm Bureau website, there are more than 25,000 farms in South Carolina amounting to nearly 5 million acres of farmland. Some of the best farmland for crop production can be found right here in the Lowcountry, where the ground is naturally moist with medium-textured soils ideal for agriculture. Unfortunately, we are seeing a concerning trend as rural and agricultural lands are quickly disappearing throughout the nation, especially here in South Carolina. According to the American Farmland Trust, South Carolina is one of the top ten states most threatened by agricultural land loss. In a blog titled "How Farmland Fuels the Lowcountry's Economy," Victoria Bock with Lowcountry Land Trust points out some interesting facts. She states, "According to a 2023 study by the American Farmland Trust, agriculture contributes over \$2 billion annually to the Lowcountry economy, making it the region's largest industry. Despite this, we are losing an estimated 200 acres per day of agricultural and forested lands." Aside from its economic impact, local farms can also provide environmental benefits, improve food safety, encourage healthy eating, and bring communities together. While the Lowcountry has some of the most productive farmland in the state, development and urban sprawl continue to increase and put stress on the farming industry. The Greenbelt Department partners with organizations like Lowcountry Land Trust and has helped fund a significant amount of conservation easements that forever protect

productive farmland. Conservation easements protect agricultural practices and valuable natural resources while allowing the owner to stay on the land. In addition, fee simple acquisitions can be funded like Thornhill Farm, a 93.96-acre farm purchased by Lowcountry Land Trust and currently managed by Chucktown Acres. The farm serves as a regenerative agricultural model, but also provides an opportunity to educate the public and raise awareness about the importance of saving the nation's farms.
