Greenbelt Plan Review Tasks Gather Public Input – Stakeholders

Stakeholders:

(Charleston Moves, Coastal Conservation League, East Coast Land Trust, Edisto Island Open Land Trust, Lowcounty Land Trust, The Nature Conservancy, Charleston Waterkeeper):

- Voters believed they were voting for program that was substantially similar to current program
- Maintain 70% rural/30% urban, possibly no-allocation method
- High priority to sea islands, blue and green corridors, productive landscapes, passive/active greenspace, natural resources, resilient greenspaces
- Encouraged use of other "tools" in the conservation toolbox
- Offered a sample of criteria


Greenbelt Plan Review Tasks Gather Public Input – GAB Meetings

GAB Meeting Comments:

- GAB should be the body that reviews projects
- Make sure projects are leveraged with match and partnerships
- Water corridors should be a priority
- Base projects on merit
- Look at program from new perspective, not trying to fit old program into current needs
- Consider the current 70% rural/30% urban allocation and why it was established to begin with
- Consider that urban areas have sources of funds that rural does not
- Bank Board should not be eliminated because it gives the process more objectivity and members have expertise
- Funds available from current sales tax could be used as transition funding to satisfy muni until decision is made
- Asked that GAB meet with land trusts and mayors to get their feed back and consider them as a resource; land trusts want to be part of process and assist
- CCPRC's P2P Plan can be a starting point for connectivity planning/projects
- Consider the heritage/cultural communities that are being forgotten and forced out due to development; critical to preserve these areas
- Consider the rural areas



Which of the following landscapes do you feel are most important for the Greenbelt Program? (Select all that apply)





Current Criteria

Tell Us About the Project - 30 Points

- Distinguishing characteristics 10 pts
- Location and size 5 points
- Address public access and use 5 points
- Project will help to balance land use development 5 points
- Threat of Loss 5 points

Current Criteria

What Makes the Project Special - 35 Points

- Environmental features 10 points
- Historic and cultural features 10 points
- Quality of Life 5 points
- Linkage/connectivity opportunities 5 points
- Consistent with adopted plans (Greenbelt Plan, etc) 5 points

Original Criteria

How Can We Make the Project Work - 35 Points

- Funding and leveraging 15 points
- Financial partners 5 points
- Level of public support 5 points
- Non-financial partners 5 points
- Implementation 5 points


Draft Greenbelt Criteria

Greenbelt Definition

- **Passive greenspace:** Trails, greenways, interpretive parks, and access points for water activities, such as fishing, crabbing, boating, etc.
- Active greenspace: Play fields and parks with low environmental impact
- Lowcountry natural resources: Upland forests, swamps, bogs, brackish and freshwater wetlands, Carolina bays, marsh islands, and cypress, backwater, and saltwater marshes
- Productive landscapes: Lands used for agriculture, silviculture, and mariculture
- Heritage landscapes: Irreplaceable cultural and historical landscapes unique to the County
- Corridors: Scenic roadways, abandoned rail lines, utility corridors, and scenic waterways
- Natural infrastructure: Floodplains, wildlife habitat, riparian zones, and lands critical to clean water
- Reclaimed greenspace: Brownfields, abandoned sites, and other green infill projects



Greenbelt Vision

- Based on Hubs and Spokes Model



Greenbelt Criteria – Greenbelt Vision

Meets the Greenbelt vision:

- Trail/corridor connected to a greenspace
- Trail/corridor connected to another trail/corridor
- Trail/corridor connected to a neighborhood and/or school
- Trail connecting to a retail or jobs center
- Trail where none currently exists (none exists within ??? miles)
- Provides linkage to a blue trail
- Greenspace connected to a trail/corridor
- Greenspace connected to another greenspace
- Greenspace connected to a neighborhood and/or school
- Greenspace connected to a retail or jobs center
- Protected greenspace where none currently exists (none exists within ??? miles)

(Ranked on public's, municipalities' and GAB's stated desires for connectivity issues to be addressed.)

Greenbelt System Components

Rural Greenbelt Lands - Represents a minimum "target" recommendation by the consultant. Desired acreage would be conserved through various acquisition methods using Conservation Toolbox and Sales Tax proceeds, specifically targeting lands noted in the Comprehensive Plan as high priority Resource Management areas.

Francis Marion National Forest - Based on multi-agency MOU that identifies this as the amount of private land holdings within the Francis Marion National Forest Proclamation boundary.

Lowcountry Wetlands - Represents an "infill" and "as needed" recommendation by the consultant for both rural and urban landscapes where additional wetland protection is needed.

PRC Regional Parks - Based on PRC Open Space Analysis.

Urban Greenbelt Lands - Represents a minimum "target" recommendation by the consultant; takes into account wish lists provided by North Charleston, Mt. Pleasant, Charleston and beach communities. Also based on PRC Open Space Analysis for urban areas.

Greenway Corridors - Based on a 200 mile system of greenways throughout the County. Greenways would be 50-foot wide corridors.








Protection of Lowcountry Natural Resources and Natural Infrastructure:

Draft Criteria – Historical and Cultural Features

Historical and cultural features:

- Existing remains of buildings, earthworks or historical significance
- Documented historical event occurrence
- Culturally significant land
- Oral tradition of historical occurrence
- No historical or cultural significance

Draft Criteria – Threat of Loss

Threat of Loss:

- Protects endangered/threatened wildlife habitat under immediate threat of loss
- Protects land under immediate threat of loss to development
- Protects wetlands/marsh under threat of loss to development or rising tides
- Protects culturally significant lands under threat of loss
- Protects productive lands under threat of loss
- Project poses unique opportunity not likely to present itself again
- No threat of loss

Draft Criteria – Consistent with Adopted Plans

Consistent with Adopted Plans:

- Greenbelt Plan
- County's Comp Plan
- Regional Bike/Ped Plans
- Municipal Plan
- Other

Draft Criteria – Ready for Immediate Action

- Project is ready for immediate action:
 - Acquisition will take place within 6 months of approval
 - Acquisition will take place more than 6 months of approval
 - Property will be open to the public immediately
 - Property will be open to the public within 1 year
 - Property will be open to the public within 5 years
 - Property will be open to the public more than 5 years

Draft Criteria – Funding and Leveraging

Funding and leveraging:

- 1% 4% Match
- 5% 10% Match
- 11% 24% Match
- 25% 49% Match
- 50% 74% Match
- 75% 100% Match
- No match

Draft Criteria – Project Management

Project Management:

- Staff dedicated to land management, maintenance and deed restriction enforcement
- Staff experienced in financial management of land
- Financial resources for land management

Draft Criteria – Partnership and Coordination

Partnership and Coordination:

- More than one financial partner
- More than one non-financial partner
- No partners

(Part of original criteria)

Draft Criteria – Return on Investment

Return on Investment:

- Provides jobs
- Provides recreation and/or tourism income
- Provides economic benefit (timbering, farmland)
- Other

Draft Criteria – Level of Public Support

Level of Public Support:

- Support Letters/Emails from public
- Results of Public Hearing
- Other
